by Anne Blankman

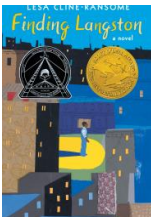

by Marlene Targ Brill

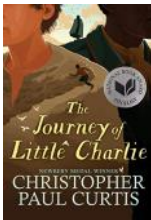
The fictionalized diary of a twelve-year-old boy who joins the Union army as a drummer and ends up fighting in the Civil War.

Series Isu - *I Survived the Galveston Hurricane, 1900*

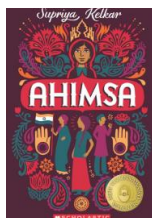

by Supriya Kelkar

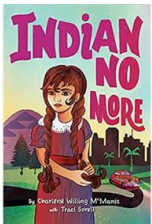

by Nicole Panteleakos

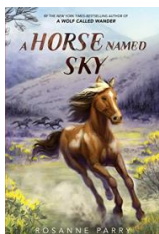
